CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE 2021


Over the summer break, the cafeteria went through a long awaited update. Work lasted most of the summer, and we were able to get the doors opened just in time for our brand new school year.

In Memoriam

Carl Edward Ritchey

Carl Edward Ritchey, 90, of Oshawa, passed away suddenly on Friday, December 3rd, 2021 after a week surrounded by family. Carl was born on June 25th, 1931, in Regina, Saskatchewan. An exceptionally sharp academic from an early age, he started Canadian University College in Alberta at just 17 years old. He continued his education to include a Bachelor's of English from Queen's University and a Master's of Education from the University of Toronto. Carl met his wife Verna Jones in high school and they married in 1950, having six children together.

Carl was the quintessential Renaissance Man; he was a master flapjack flipper, a natural-world enthusiast, a world traveller, and a self-made genealogist and historian. He was someone who understood music and literature on a spiritual level, and shared that love with those who surrounded him even in his last days. He was the rare combination of academic and athlete, of sincere and humorous; and his passion for education filled a bountiful career that impacted the lives of many.

Carl's career was nothing short of monumental. Beginning as a teacher in a one-room schoolhouse in Silver Creek, British Columbia, he then taught at Oshawa Missionary College (now Kingsway College) and worked as the principal at the affiliated elementary school. He was a teacher at Dr. S.J. Philips Elementary School and taught science at Ridgeway Public School while 'side-gigging' as a taxi driver, working at Oshawa Dairy Ltd. on Sundays, and teaching English to new Canadians at Oshawa Central Collegiate Institute. In 1967, he joined the Durham Board of Education as their audio-visual consultant and Curriculum Officer. Carl was also a highly respected Chairman and Board member for the Oshawa Symphony Orchestra (now Ontario Philharmonic).

In 1997, Carl married long time friend Roberta (Bint) White, and they spent 25 beautiful years trotting the globe, making memories with family and friends, and wintering in Florida. In recent years, Carl spent his days shouting out the Jeopardy answers long before the contestants, listening to music, reading favourite poems, and regaling everyone with tales of his adventurous childhood and teenage shenanigans.

Carl was predeceased by wife Verna, daughter Jacqueline, and siblings Donald, Roland, John, Hazel, and Marla. He is survived by wife Roberta and children Carla-Lynn and Bob Brown, Doug Ritchey, Linda Ritchey, Rhonda Nicholson, Keith McGuigan, Kimberly and Peter Hammermueller, and Kelly-jane and Robert Scott, along with thirteen grandchildren, fifteen great-grandchildren, and numerous loving friends.

Carl will be remembered because he was the rare type who remained your beloved teacher long after you've left the classroom; as the greatest father, husband, papa, friend, and storyteller you had ever met. He will be greatly missed.

A public outdoor graveside service will be held Thursday, December 9th, at 2:30 PM at Thornton Funeral Centre. In lieu of flowers, we ask that you instead donate to Ontario Philharmonic or the ADRA Canadian Projects.



Robert George Burgess

September 30, 1927 - January 1, 2022

Bob passed away peacefully in his sleep at St. Helena Hospital, (where he had volunteered 1,000+ hours) on the first Sabbath of the new year. What a blessed day to go to rest!

The only son of seven children born to Martha and Robert in Pembroke, Ontario, he graduated from OMC and earned a full scholarship to WWC by selling the most books of any colporter in Canada one summer. He married Treva Graves, from Moncton, New Brunswick, in 1948. Throughout his 40+ years of service to the SDA church, he served as a missionary in Pakistan, Ceylon, Taiwan, South Korea, and ultimately in China, fulfilling a lifelong dream.

He witnessed to the community through the men's service organization Kiwanis for 35 years, serving as the Lieutenant Governor in Martinez, California and starting chapters in Taipei, Taiwan and Burtonsville, Maryland. While creating the Business Department at Sahmyook University in Seoul, South Korea, he also directed the Serviceman's GI Center and for three years wrote a weekly column for the Korean Times. One week he titled his column "Easter Sunday and the Sabbath," which the editor changed to "Sunday the Wrong Sabbath." The editor told Bob that he got more phone calls from that article than any other ever printed. Bob was invited with 30 others to attend the inauguration for General Westmoreland over all the United Nations troops in Korea. The General recognized Bob from his weekly newspaper column and asked him if he got paid to write the column. Bob replied yes, a little, which he said he used to pay tuition for three Korean children. The General told Bob that he reached more people with his writing than all the ministers in all the churches in all of Korea.

Bob's mother was the first convert baptized by H.M.S. Richards in Canada, and she raised him to love and serve the Lord. He studied his Sabbath School Lesson daily, taught SS classes, preached sermons, and witnessed to those around him at every opportunity, and in Heaven he will have the opportunity to meet those who came to Christ through all the seeds he planted.

With Timothy he would say, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing." II Timothy 4:7-8



Marcus Rodgers

1937-2020

Born in Derby, England on March 6, 1937. Died April 13, 2020 in E Lansing, Michigan.

During World War II, Marc and his parents were among the 2100 internees rescued from the Japanese POW camp at Los Banos, Philippines by the US 11th airborne division in February, 1945.

Marc completed high school at OMC in Oshawa, Ontario in 1954. He received a BS degree from Western Michigan University in 1961, where he played on the first WMU hockey club for founder and Coach Harry Lawson. He began working for the Michigan Department of Social Services in 1961 and was supervisor of children's services and juvenile delinquency programs for Kalamazoo County. He earned a MSW degree in administration from the University of Michigan in 1966 and after moving to Lansing was director of the Juvenile Services Training Council. He was also a field supervisor for the WMU social work program and he conducted juvenile delinquency training for the Michigan State police. Marc moved to the state Office of Child Support in 1983 as a division administrator and project director for the child support automation system.

Marc was preceded in death by his parents, A. George Rodgers and Rosa M. Rodgers of Oshawa, Ontario, Canada.

He is survived by his sister, Anita (Larry) Clark, sons Rick (Carmen) Rodgers and Bob (Cindy) Rodgers, daughter Lisa (Brian) Allen and stepson Brad (Coburn) Horn and 5 grandchildren.
